President's Report

ear SUSK delegates:
On behalf of the National SUSK Executive, welcome to the 2015 National SUSK Congress in Montreal!

At just a touch over 60 years young, SUSK has played an integral role in the Ukrainian Canadian community by engaging youth and fostering their development for future positions in both their career and community. SUSK inspires and cultivates our future Ukrainian Canadian leadership: it fosters pride and a sense of identity, and provides young people with opportunities for self-development and growth. I have had the great privilege of working alongside dedicated and talented Ukrainian Canadian students this past year. I hope to convey the achievements and challenges of this past year by highlighting the key pillars of SUSK's activities.

Communications

A key priority for SUSK has been its internal communications with member USOs, Ukrainian Canadian students, and SUSK alumni. Key communication channels include: SUSK websites (main SUSK website, SUSK Congress website, SUSK Student website); social media (Facebook, Twitter, Youtube, LinkedIn, Wikipedia); formal electronic releases; and regularly published issues of our flagship publication, "Student". Through these communiqués, we have been able to better outline our position on various issues, share our initiatives and experiences, and more effectively convey the essence of SUSK to our membership and to the public.

Ukrainian Canadian Congress Dragons Competition

A key priority for this past year was the implementation of initiatives tied to the SUSK's success in the Ukrainian Dragons Competition hosted by the UCC. In November 2013, SUSK was awarded \$25,000 by the Ukrainian Dragons – a group of leading Ukrainian Canadian entrepreneurs and philanthropists – to foster the development of the future leaders of the Ukrainian Canadian community through the following components:

- a) National Coordinator Position: SUSK will hire an individual for a full-time paid position working alongside UCC in Ottawa to help offset the challenges associated with high turnover in our National Executive. The National Coordinator will work to preserve organizational continuity by handling organizing and preserving SUSK archives, enabling SUSK to establish long-term projects and goals, developing a coherent fundraising strategy, and handling administrative business, particularly relating to the annual National SUSK Congress.
- b) National Networking Event Series: This past year, SUSK launched a national series of networking events, whose aim was to actively engage students with events to build professional skills as well as to foster relationships with successful Ukrainian Canadians, including SUSK alumni. The national series consists of networking events hosted in collaboration with Ukrainian Canadian professionals in Calgary, Edmonton, Saskatoon, Winnipeg, Toronto, and Montreal. Through this initiative, we have worked to better address student needs, while also strengthening our community by fostering a sense of belonging and reciprocity across generations.
- c) USO Project Fund: In order to better support our member USOs, SUSK took the charge in creating a project fund, which will be made available to every member USO in the 2015-2016 academic year to run a local initiative. This initiative aims to build the local capacity of our USOs by providing them with opportunities to run initiatives, knowing that these experiences will equip them with the skills they need to successfully run community organizations, now and in the future.
- d) USO "Best Practices" Database: At the 2015 National SUSK Congress, we will host a session devoted to sharing of best practices from USOs across the country. This exchange will allow USOs to interact with and learn from one another, and provide another avenue through which SUSK can work to build the capacity of its member USOs.

Crisis in Ukraine

Ukraine's Maidan Revolution and the subsequent Russian invasion of Ukraine significantly impacted SUSK activities this past year, creating both extraordinary opportunities and challenges for SUSK. Since November 2013, SUSK and its member USOs have remained vigilant, closely monitoring the developments in Ukraine and participating in community initiatives both at home and abroad. This year, SUSK continued its Shevchenko "Надія — Hope" t-shirt project, which served as a tribute to both the 200th anniversary of the birth of Ukrainian poet and bard Taras Shevchenko and to the spirit of Maidan. SUSK was proud to donate a portion of the proceeds raised through this initiative to support the Maidan movement in Ukraine. In addition, in February 2015, we launched the "Stop Putin!" sticker project, in an effort to empower Ukrainian Canadian students in their demonstrations and awareness campaigns in the community and on university campuses. In a similar spirit, we intend to donate a portion of the proceeds to assisting with immediate needs associated with the ongoing crisis in Ukraine.

Although developing initiatives to impact the ongoing crisis in Ukraine has at times left us feeling pessimistic and obscure, SUSK and its member USOs, together with the broader Ukrainian Canadian community, have done tremendous work to support Ukraine over the last 18 months. For myself, this was most demonstrably expressed by Ukrainian President Petro Poroshenko's speech given to the Canadian Parliament in September 2014. I often think back to that experience, reflecting on the privilege I had to represent SUSK at that momentous occasion, listening to the deep gratitude expressed by President Poroshenko for Canada's unwavering support of Ukraine, and feeling so incredibly proud of my Ukrainian Canadian heritage and of my involvement in our cherished Ukrainian Canadian community. Just as I am certain that all of us have had such moments in the last 18 months, I am also certain that we will have many more in the near future, and I hope that they serve to remind us of our ties to Ukraine and its people, and ensure that we remain vigilant and do all that we can to help them.

Since its revival in 2007, SUSK has continued to grow and flourish. This past year's successes and achievements are a testament not only to the outgoing National SUSK Executive, but also to the ones that preceded it - the collective efforts, contributions, and dedication of all SUSKites are what made it possible for SUSK to excel this past year. I'd like to thank each and every one of them for contributing to the SUSK legacy and helping us get to where we are today. FINANCIAL REPORT

To the Stakeholders of the Ukrainian Canadian Students' Union:

As the Vice President of Finance for the 2014-2015 SUSK Executive year, I would like to say what a great experience it was to work alongside my fellow Executive members this year. They were some of the most creative and friendly students I've met in my life. The passion that everyone on this team felt for delivering the vision of SUSK made my term unforgettable. It was truly a humbling experience to help SUSK deliver on its objectives to help grow the Ukrainian Canadian student community. I enjoyed working on maintaining the accountability and positive impact of this not-for-profit organization. Thank you to everyone on the Executive for their commitment, along with the many donors and sponsors whose continued support is crucial to both the short and long term sustainability of our organization.

In an effort to continue the stability and fair representation of the SUSK Financial Statements, my recommendations for the incoming Executive are:

1. Accurate and clear record keeping is a crucial part to the preparation of the annual financial statements. All those involved with financial transactions on behalf of SUSK should keep a clear paper trail so that any confusion can be minimized. It is recommended that a General Ledger system is implemented. Every transaction that occurs should have a balanced double-entry recorded to the debit and credit side. Following this system all year will allow for better record keeping and a simpler way in creating the annual financial statements. In addition, if the General Ledger is automatically linked to the financial statements, quarterly financial reports could be created for the executive without much effort.



- 2. Excel spreadsheets are an appropriate choice for SUSK tracking because of their transparency, ease of use and high availability. It is recommended to the incoming Executive to continue to use Microsoft Excel spreadsheets for bookkeeping.
- 3. SUSK's fiscal year continues to be May 1st to April 30th. This fiscal year follows the regular university school year, allowing training time for the incoming Executive over the less active summer months. It is recommended SUSK continues to use this fiscal year to present all future financial statements.



4. SUSK's accounting policies are based on Canadian Not-For-Profit Generally Accepted Accounting Principles. This entails the use of the accrual method of accounting, where economic events are recognized in the period they occur, rather than the period in which cash



transactions occur. Under this method, revenues and expenses are reflected in the period in which they are actually earned or incurred. *It is recommended that the incoming SUSK Executive continue to use this method and accrue all applicable 2015 SUSK National Congress expenses in Montreal to fiscal 2016 (May 1st, 2015 – April 30th, 2016).*

5. Although SUSK's recordkeeping is fairly basic, and Microsoft Excel has proven a useful and easy method of bookkeeping, it is important to note that not all students have the training or knowledge of basic accounting and bookkeeping. It is recommended that the



future Vice President Finance have proven experience in a treasurer role, or is enrolled in financial or accounting classes at their post-secondary institution. If an experienced candidate cannot be found, it is recommended that future SUSK Executives look at the possibility of professional accounting assistance.

6. The sustainability of an annual large-scale national event, such as the SUSK Congress is a risk every year, based on the numbers of registered delegates and sponsor or donor support. In an effort to maintain the long-term sustainability of SUSK, it is recommended that the incoming SUSK Executive begins discussions of the benefits and disadvantages of moving the SUSK Congress from an annual to bi- or tri- annual congress basis.



For the three prior fiscal years, SUSK had operated in a financial deficit financed by a surplus of cash accumulated in previous years. This year, I am glad to announce SUSK has a \$3,891 surplus for the 2015 fiscal year. The surplus was largely the result of increased revenue, as expenses were similar to last year. Selling "Hope" Taras Shevchenko t-shirts, increased donations, and better than expected 2014 Congress finances were the main driving forces behind this new surplus. The majority of SUSK expenses go to funding the annual National SUSK Congress, and it is very important that future Executives look at the sustainability and practicality of hosting such a large-scale event on an annual basis. However, with strong presence at the last few events, and the increasing power of social media, SUSK has done a good job in promoting and raising the profile of SUSK and our Congress.

The 2016 fiscal year should be very promising for SUSK. I send my regrets for not being present at the 2015 National SUSK Congress, but I wish everyone an enjoyable time being among the strong Ukrainian Canadian student community at yet another successful SUSK Congress! Thank you for supporting SUSK, and enjoy the Congress program!



Addendum to 2014 Financial Report

As per last year's Audit Committee Report findings, I have updated the financial report, where I can confirm that a calculation error took place. Where stated in last year's report, SUSK did not have a surplus but indeed a deficit of \$588.55 in the 2014 year. This error was caused by a miscalculation in the Conference Subsidies of which the added total was not accounted for. The error has now been corrected to reflect the deficit for 2014 and this figure will be used in calculation of the 2015 financial report documents.

We apologize for the error that incorrectly reflected SUSK's financial position and thank you for your patience as we edited these statements. I wish all delegates of the upcoming 2015 Congress in Montreal, Quebec a successful and enjoyable experience.

Notes to the Financial Statements

1. Retroactive Changes

Upon further review of the financial statements from the prior year, we have made the following retroactive changes to the Statement of Financial Positon for the 2013 and 2014 fiscal years:

a. Internally Restricted Net Assets for Student Digitization Project and Internally Restricted Net Assets for Ukrainian Dragons Commitments have been reclassified as Deferred Stude

Net Assets for Ukrainian Dragons Commitments have been reclassified as Deferred Student Digitization Project Contribution and Deferred Ukrainian Dragons Commitments Contribution, respectively. This is because these items are not for capital projects.

2. Retroactive Changes to Errors

In relation to the addendum to the financial report, there are two errors in last year's statements that have been updated in this year's statements:

a. SUSK received sponsorships payments prior to last year's Congress that should have been reported in deferred revenue. As a result deferred revenue should have been higher, at \$7,388. b. Unrestricted net assets in 2014 decrease as a result of the addendum change from a surplus to a deficiency. However, this line item also increases as a result of correctly recording the offsetting Account Receivable entry for Student sponsorship in the 2014 fiscal year. As a result, there is a net increase in the 2014 Unrestricted net asset balance from what was reported last year to this year's report.

3. Significant Accounting Policies

a. The Ukrainian Canadian Students' Union (SUSK) follows the deferral method of accounting for contributions and expenditures. Support from the general public consists of contributions relating to the prior year's campaign. Funds raised during a campaign, net of related campaign expenses and provisions, are used to provide funds for funded activities. Accordingly, they are deferred at the end of the campaign year and are recorded in the statement of operations of the following year.

b. Deferred Revenue – restricted contributions are recognized as revenue in the year in which the related expenses are incurred.

c. Donated Services – no amounts have been reflected in the financial statements for donated services, since no objective basis is available to measure the value of such services. Nevertheless, a substantial number of volunteers have donated significant amounts of their time to the Ukrainian Canadian Students' Union activities.

d. The Ukrainian Canadian Students' Union follows a fiscal year beginning on May 1st and ending on April 30th.

Roman Serbyn, Ph.D. Historian. Studied at McGill University, Université de Montréal and Sorbonne (Paris). Was active in Plast, student organizations (President of SUSK, 1968-1969, started Student). 1969-2002 taught history at Université du Québec à Montréal. Member of academic associations: C.A.S., N.T.Sh, U.V.A.N. In 1983 co-organizer of the first international conference on the Ukrainian Famine of 1933. Founder and editor of Holodomor Studies (2009-2011). Research and publications: Kyivan Rus; 19th and 20th Centuries Ukrainian history, in particular: Ukrainian national revival; Ukrainian-Jewish relations (the Sion-Osnova Controversy of 1861); Serhii Podolyns'ky (Ukrainian scholar, Marxist and patriot, 1870s); the Famine of 1921-1923; Raphael Lemkin and the conceptualization of the Ukrainian genocide; Ukrainians in World War II. Presently focused on the conceptualization of the Holodomor, as genocide against the overlapping Ukrainians national and ethnic groups, and on a holistic approach to the study of Ukraine during World War II.

Natalka Patsiurko teaches sociology at Concordia University in Montreal. Her research interests include ethnic diversity and dealing with minorities in Europe; nationalism and identity in Eastern Europe; as well as labour migration, informal economies and migration policies in Europe. Ukraine, where Natalka grew up and graduated Lviv Franko University, has always being the centre of her research. Rules of Order

As per section VIII.4.a of the Ukrainian Canadian Students' Union Constitution:

At the outset of the Congress, The President, or the Vice-President, or designate when the President is not available shall chair the election from among Delegates:

a. Presidium, composed of a Chairperson, Vice-Chairperson and two (2) Secretaries;

i. The Presidium is responsible to conduct the Congress proceedings;

Rights & Responsibilities of the Chair

- 1. Conduct sessions of the LII Congress in accordance with the adopted program, maintain order and adhere to the Rules of Order outline in the Ukrainian Canadian Students' Union Constitution
- 2. Facilitate discussion and ensure its viability
- 3. Put all motions to a vote and announce the results
- 4. Explain and decide all questions of order
- 5. Immediately suspend discussion by a delegate when;
- He/She interferes with the proceedings of the Congress or is off topic being discussed;
- A motion is made on a point of order;
- An objection to the consideration of a motion is made
- 6. Dismiss irrelevant or late motions
- 7. Conduct sessions fairly and impartially
- 8. The Vice-Chair, who conducts Congress business in the absence of the Chair, is accorded the same rights as the chair.

Rights of the Delegate

- 1. Express opinions relevant to issues place on the agenda and formulate them into concise conclusions
- 2. Put forth before the Congress proposals and motions for approval
- 3. Take part in the Congress Committee's, discuss and approve proposed resolutions at the Committees and vote on them during the appropriated times.
- 4. Have voting privileges as defined by the Ukrainian Canadian Students' Union Constitution

General Rules of Order

- 1. Question to members of the outgoing Executive be directed to the Chair
- 2. During discussion of reports each person may speak only once to summarize his remarks regarding the activities of the outgoing Executive. Comments already made by other persons should not be restated
- 3. Each person who proposes an amendment to a motion by adding to, deleting from the question or rephrasing should be immediately provided to the Congress Resolutions Committee with their proposal in writing.
- 4. A motion, once it is moved, seconded and interpreted by the Chair may be withdrawn by the mover only with the consent of the seconder

- 5. All points of order should be directed to the Chair by a motion. A motion concerning a point of order may be made under the following circumstances;
- Where there is concern about the running of business by the Chair
- When Delegates use improper or derogatory comments
- When a speaker does not speak to the issue or takes excessive time in debate

A point of order must be made immediately and stated concisely;

- Supersedes all other debate and may interrupt the speaker
- Does not require a seconder
- Must be resolved by the Chair immediately
- May be appealed to the Congress immediately after the ruling of the Chair

6. All procedural matters, which are not addressed by the Rules of Order of the Congress, shall be go erned by to Robert's Rules of Order, insofar as they do not contradict the Ukrainian Canadian Student's Union Constitution

Voting

- $1. \ \mbox{Voting}$ for the SUSK National Executive will be conducted by secret ballot
- 2. Voting for the proposed Constitutional Amendments will be conducted by secret ballot
- 3. Voting for proposed Resolutions will be conducted by show of Delegate voting cards.
- 4. Counting of votes cast will be conducted by the Congress Elections & Verifications Committee

Rsolutions

- 1. The Congress Resolutions Committee shall receive and present the proposed resolutions of the Committees of the Congress.
- 2. The Resolutions Committee may revise, re-order or amalgamate resolutions in order to:
- Ensure consistency in their format;
- Avoid duplication of similar principles or concepts
- 3. The Congress Resolutions Committee may also review and propose resolutions not covered by the Committees
- 4. Each resolution must be proposed by the Congress Resolutions Committee for consideration by the Congress
- 5. Each Delegate has the right to submit a resolution to the Congress Resolutions Committee in writing.
- 6. The resolutions may be discussed during the appropriate session within a limited time period specified by the Congress Chair.
- 7. Any amendments to the resolutions arising from the sessions must be agreed to by either the Chair of the Congress Resolutions Committee or his/her designate.


